SB397	Medicaid Professional Fees Increase: Bringing payments for professionals billing under Medicaid up

Healthy and Welcomed Births

SB1	 Abortion provider and access protections: Extension of protections for health care professionals who are providing reproductive health care; housekeeping and strengthening of abortion statutes re: telemedicine, definitions, etc. Update: Act 2 signed into law by Governor on 3/22/23, including elements from SB1 and HB1441/SB890.
HB1343	Abortion Access Coordinator: Creation and funding for an Abortion [Reproductive Health] Access Coordinator Office within Department of Human Services.
SECONDARY PRI	ORITIES
HB1179, 1180 SB892, 893	Reproductive Health Equity Act (RHEA): Requires health insurance coverage for various sexual and reproductive health care services, with or without cost sharing.
SCR18	RHEA Assessment (Resolution): Requests the auditor to conduct social and financial assessment of proposed mandatory health insurance coverage for sexual and reproductive health care services. Update: Adopted by the House and the Senate. Need to encourage Legislative leadership to ask auditor to prioritize this assessment.
HCR7	Lactation Support Provider Expansion (Resolution): Requests that Department of Human Services Med-QUEST Division and Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs expand the types of qualified providers allowed to provide lactation consultant services for Medicaid recipients. Update: Adopted by the House and the Senate.
HB899	 FASD Awareness Month: Recognizes September as Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) Awareness Month to promote public awareness of the risks of alcohol consumption during pregnancy. Update: Act 12 signed into law by Governor on 4/19/23.
SB318	 FASD Pilot Program: Requires Department of Health to establish and administer 3-year pilot program on prevention, screening, assessment, and intervention of Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD). Update: Passed with \$485,000 allocated.

SB295	Malama `Ohana: Proposal for a working group through the Office of Wellness and Resilience to hold listening sessions throughout the state and have community partners work together to improve and transform the child welfare system. Update: Passed with no appropriation
HB490 SB1007	Paid Family Leave: Would provide wage replacement (a percentage of one's income) to eligible workers when they take time off from work to care for a seriously ill family member or themselves or to bond with a new child.
HB241 SB1126 (measures died but CDTC increase put into budget)	 Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit: Proposes reforms to the existing state CDCTC to provide increased benefits to a greater number of families with dependents. Update: Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit was increased from \$2,400 per taxpayer to \$10,000 and was incorporated into HB300.
HB1049 SB1347 (measures died but EITC increase put into budget)	 Tax Relief to Ease Cost of Living (Green Affordability Plan): Proposes new tax credits, improved benefits, and adjustments to tax policies to reduce the cost of living for families, teachers and low-income individuals. Update: Earned Income Tax Credit was doubled (to 40% of the federal credit) via HB300

HB855	End Taxes on Diapers: Would end taxes on diapers, which will combat economic hardship and help reduce the high levels of stress caregivers experience.
HB233 SB357	Child Tax Credit: Proposal to create a state CTC to fill the gaps left by the reduced federal CTC.
SB1439	Rent Relief: Proposal for a permanent, state-funded rent relief program to provide temporary assistance to families who miss a rent payment. Intended to create greater housing stability and provide temporary relief.
HB548 SB308	Erin's Law: Would mandate that DOE provide sexual abuse education to all students (K-12), educators and parents/guardians. Note: Measures did not survive but DOE did receive funding to address some items in the bill
HB581	Mandatory Domestic Violence Training for Custody Evaluators and Fact Finders: Would require custody evaluators and fact finders to take a minimum of 5 hours of domestic violence training before they can be added to the list of custody evaluators at the Judiciary, and a requirement for continuing educations.
HB618 SB984	Removing Mandatory Mediation in Paternity Proceedings for Domestic Violence Victims: Proposal to amend the paternity proceedings to match the existing divorce proceedings - removing the requirement for mediation for survivors.
HB483, 582 SB238, 952	Extension of civil statute of limitations for sexual abuse: Would amend civil statute of limitations for child sexual abuse to allow for longer period of time (age 50 years) to file civil lawsuit against abusers.
HB300	 DHS Budget Asks: Additional funds for FRCs, funds for CWS, funds for child wellness pilot (\$50 for child wellness visit), and funds for clothing/school supplies TANF/TAONF. Update: HB300 passed with significant legislative wins for young children and families - see <u>Commit to Keiki update</u>

SB1351	Early Childhood Mental Health: Establishes the Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health Program within the Department of Health to support and build out the system of mental health services for children from birth to age five.
HB1248	DA BUX: Funding to support Double Up Food Bucks (Hawaii healthy food incentive program), which partners with food retailers to make Hawai'i grown fruits and vegetables more affordable for SNAP-EBT cardholders.
HB69	Full-Service Community Schools: Proposal to expand and provide funding for full-service community schools, in which schools become the hub of their community and coordinate relationships and resources to accelerate equitable outcomes in health, education, and employment.

SB908	Sugar-Sweetened Beverages: Imposes a fee on sugar-sweetened beverages and creates a special fund to support efforts to prevent obesity and chronic disease
SB894	 Office of Wellness and Resilience: Transfers OWR from the Office of the Governor to the Department of Human Services. Reconstitutes the membership of the Trauma-Informed Care Task Force into a permanent advisory board to the Office of Wellness and Resilience to be called the Wellness and Resilience Advisory Board. Update: Fully funded at \$895,000 plus 6 FTE

HB960	SFA Preschool Facilities Fund Transfer: Transfers \$200,000,000 of general funds previously appropriated to the School Facilities Authority of the Department of Education to the school facilities special fund.

SB1022	 Early Learning Board: Amends the composition and qualifications of the Early Learning Board to consist of individuals from each county, instead of from particular entities or types of providers. Establishes general qualifications for the members. Update: Final language stipulates 1 voting member for each County except Honolulu, while will have 3, plus 3 additional at-large voting members; DOE, DHS, DOH, UH, KS and HAIS to serve in ex-officio, non-voting capacity
SB481	Kindergarten Entry Assessment: Repeals standardized assessment requirements for students entering kindergarten.
