





Guide the Design of an Initiative to Ensure Family Engagement

The Family Engagement Checklist is a tool that is used by the ITCP (as defined by the State Team, State Advisory Team, Site Implementation Team, or National Resource Center) to identify supports currently in place or needed to ensure meaningful family engagement in systems-level initiatives.

Family Engagement Checklist

Domain 1: Commitment	Yes	No	Some what	Don't know
The ITCP team uses written policy that requires family engagement in systems-level initiatives.				
The ITCP team has one or more champions of family engagement.				
The ITCP team acknowledges the contributions parent leaders make to systems-level initiatives.				
The ITCP team's budget includes funding for parent leaders' time and/or other costs they incur (for example, travel, per diem).				
The ITCP team provides adequate time for staff to implement changes that result from engagement of parent leaders in systems-levels initiatives (for example, educating staff about new policies).				

Domain 2: Transparency	Yes	No	Some what	Don't know
The ITCP team conducts activities to understand the issues faced by the children and families they serve (for example, a case review, examining data or facilitating a focus group).				
The ITCP team ensures all staff and parent leaders have a clear understanding of the initiative they will work on together.				
The ITCP team provides the supports parent leaders and staff need to understand their partnership role (for example mentors/coaching and reflective consultation).				
The ITCP team ensures all participants have the support they need to participate in meetings (for example, physical access, interpreters, time away from other work responsibilities).				
The ITCP team ensures all participants are provided with the information they need to participate in meetings.				
Domain 3: Representation	Yes	No	Some what	Don't know
Parent leaders are representative of the races, ethnicities, and gender of the populations served by the initiative.				
Parent leaders are representative of the cultures and languages of the populations served by the initiative.				
Parent leaders are representative of the parents including dads with lived experience who have navigated the child welfare system as a parent.				
Parent leaders are representative of geographic areas in which populations served by the initiative live.				

NOTE: If one or more of the four demographic characteristics in **Domain 3: Representation**, do not match your priorities for the populations served by the initiative you are assessing, you can replace them with criteria that do match your priorities. For example, your organization may be looking for parent leaders of certain ages, disabilities, gender, etc.

ITCP team members engage parent leaders in choosing goals for the initiative.				
ITCP team members work together with parent leaders to implement the initiative.				
ITCP team members work together with parent leaders to evaluate the initiative.				
ITCP team members use parent leaders' input to improve the initiative.				
ITCP team members can explain how parent leaders contribute to the initiative.
